Course Description: Students will gain valuable knowledge of forest management techniques and interventions commonly used in of U.S. forests, and understand their usefulness for developing sustainable management regimes. The course will introduce forest biometric data collection and survey techniques, and their linkages to foundations of forest ecology including plant anatomy, specialization of plant organs, and plant reproductive cycles. Specific focus will be given to three forest management objectives: ecological, economic, and social, and how to integrate each objective into a sustainable management for a specific forest stand.

#### **Learning Outcomes:**

In this course, students will learn:

- Fundamental concepts in silviculture and sustainable forestry, with particular focus on US and Scandinavian forests.
- To qualitatively and quantitatively evaluate forest parcels
- To evaluate relevant scientific research and apply it to practical forestry issues
- To appreciate and work with the diversity of functions and stakeholders related to forests
- To apply a pragmatic systems-approach to global forests

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Learning outcomes are what the students know and can do by the end of the course. Learning outcomes state in clear terms what it is that your students should be able to do at the end of a course that they could not do at the beginning.

# **Course Materials:**

# **Course Requirements** (% of final grade)

# 1) Textbook assignment (10%)

# (available on canvas... textbook purchase necessary)

This assignment is designed to introduce concepts of sustainability and ecosystem service consideration in forest management. These concepts will be incorporated into most aspects of the course for the duration.

# 2) Participation (25%)

Active participation in lecture is essential to a good grade in this class, and will be measured through attendance and contributions to discussions.

# 3) Paper reviews (25%)

The lecture section of the class will be paper-heavy, and we will typically discuss 1-2 papers per session. These paper review worksheets will help guide your reading of the paper (and ensure that you do in fact read them!).

# 4) Forest Certification paper (20%)

This is something like an in-depth literature review and will consist of evaluating two forest certification programs and how they compare to one another. This will include their cost-effectiveness to landowners, comprehensiveness of their sustainability objectives, and which program the student would choose if they owned forested land.

# 5) Global forests / Tree diseases paper/presentation (20%)

The class will conclude with a short paper accompanied by a series of presentations that target major forest regions around the world. This is aimed at addressing similar topics and issues that we discussed in class.

I will not be taking attendance in this class—that said, I do expect that assignments are submitted whether or not you attend the session. In general, every day an assignment is late will result in a 10% penalty (the equivalent of a full letter grade). Contact me well in advance if you have a good justification for why something will be late and want an extension—and a minute before the deadline won't count as I'll need time to consider the request and respond.

I like to maintain a relatively informal atmosphere during class, but I insist that you be courteous and respectful to everyone in the class, both in the classroom and online. Failure to do so will be reflected in your participation grade and could lead to further action.

# **Regarding plagiarism:**

#### 1) Know what it is

Plagiarism is one of the deadly intellectual sins, along with cheating, fabrication, and a few others (see the above links). Most simply, plagiarism is when you claim someone else's words or ideas as your own. Of course, this doesn't mean that you shouldn't use other people's words and ideas, just that you need to give them appropriate credit, such as through citations and quotation marks for direct quotes. Copying and pasting something off the internet without referencing the source is a common example of plagiarism. A less common example is copying and pasting from your own previous work, but in SPEA that also counts.

#### 2) And then don't do it

Please, just don't. It is a lazy shortcut that is both illegal (really!) and, in the end is really not much of a shortcut for all the trouble it brings. It is also very easy to spot and often even easier to confirm. It would probably take more time and energy to get away with plagiarizing than it would to just not plagiarize in the first place.

#### 3) Otherwise...

If it is a clear case of plagiarism, the first response will be a warning that consists of a zero on the assignment, a 50-100% cut to your participation grade for the class (depending on the severity of the case), and an official report to the program office that will go on your record. A second case will result in more than a slap on the wrist.

#### **Writing Help**

If you are concerned about plagiarism or simply want to improve your writing skills,

#### **Incompletes and Late Withdrawals**

If we get well into the semester and "dire circumstances relating to extended illness or equivalent distress" (IU Enrollment and Student Academic Information Bulletin) prevent you from finishing the class, you have the option to request either a late withdrawal or an incomplete grade. The first option should be done if you are past the normal withdrawal period but not near the end of the semester, and the second if you have completed most of the work for the class but the dire circumstances are preventing you from completing major final projects or tests.
